## BEFORE YOU START

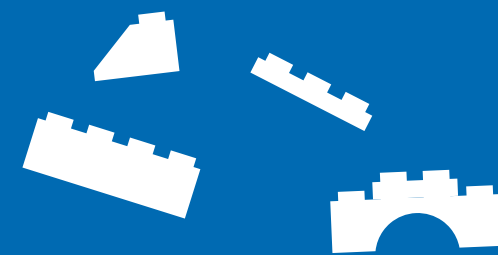

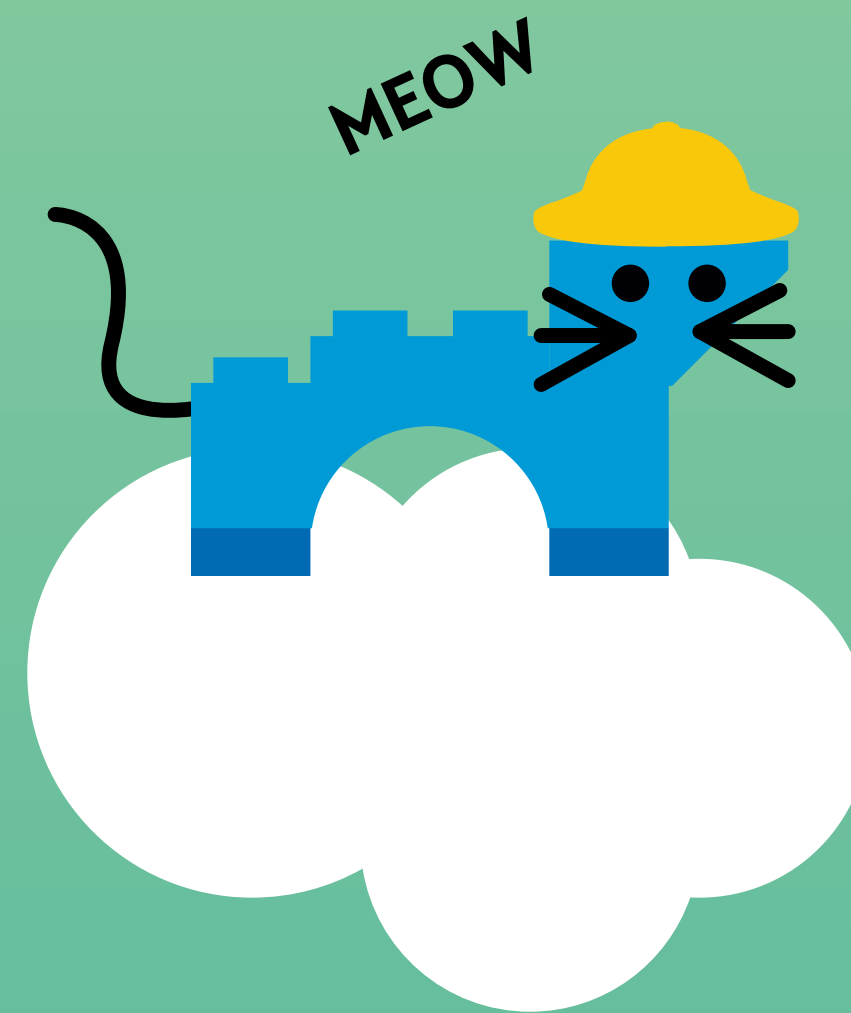


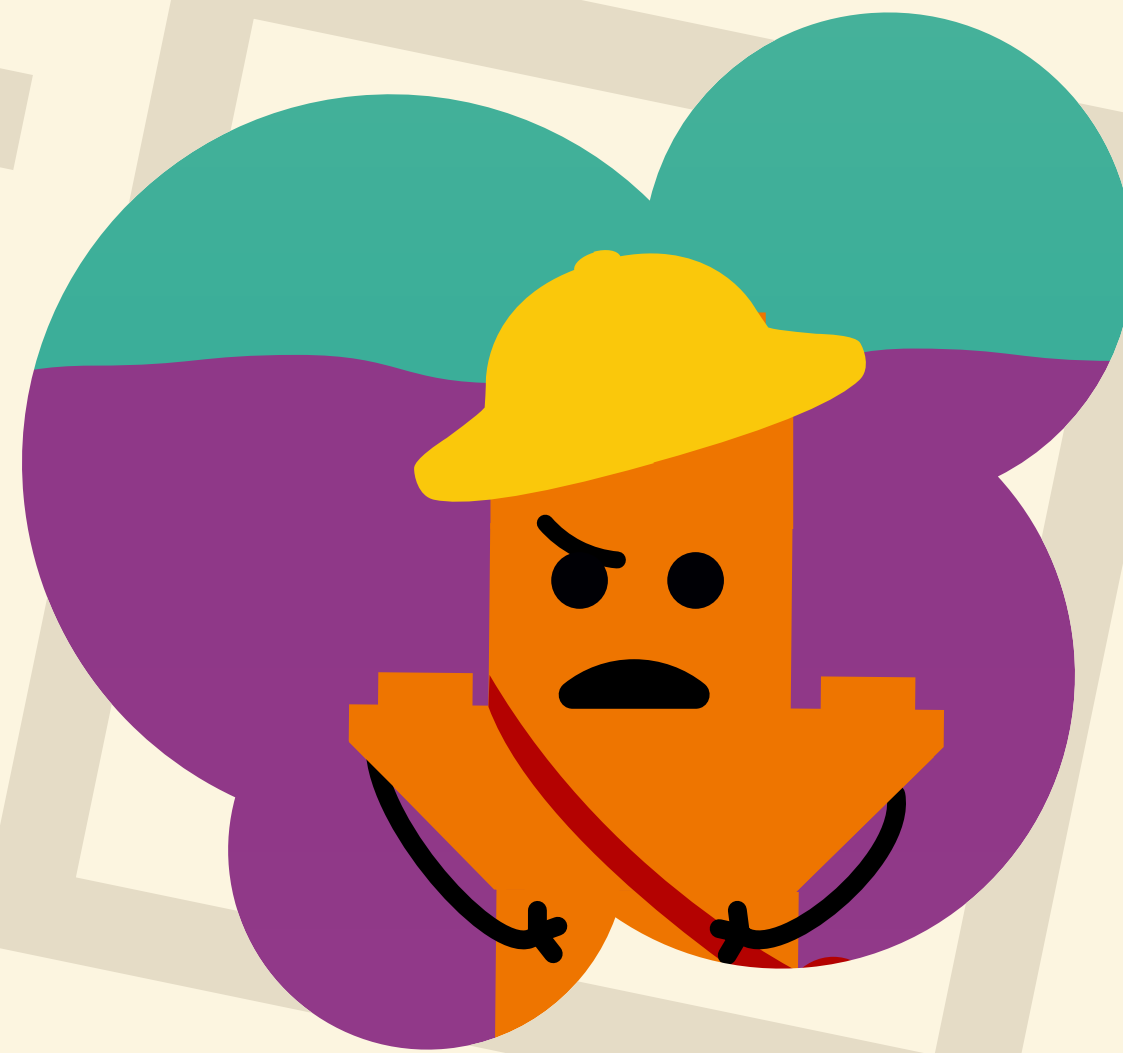


My book will help every online explorer

my book and ATE all the pictures.

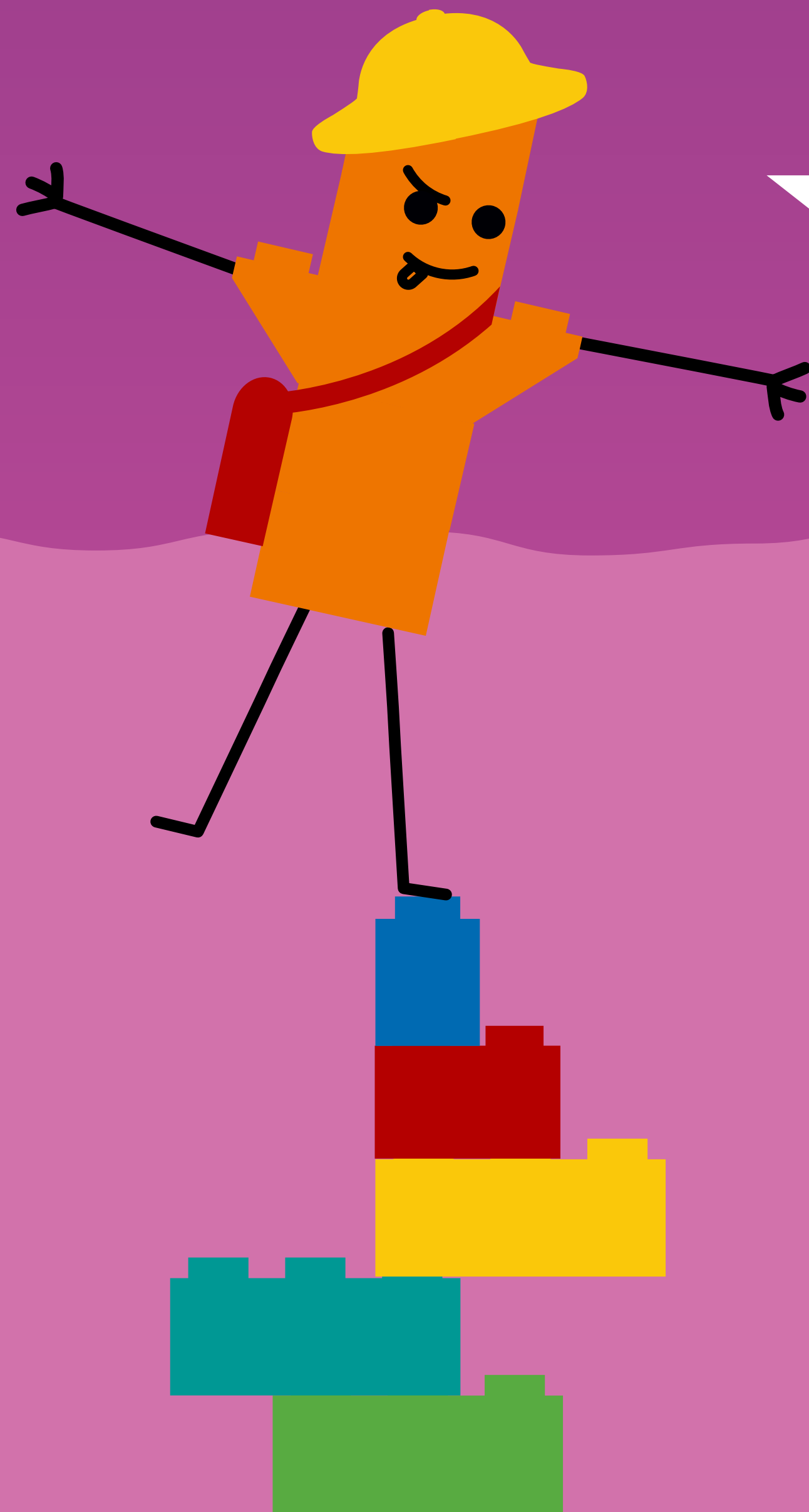




Only a few scraps of my book remain and NO pictures.

Don't worry, I'll help every step of the way!

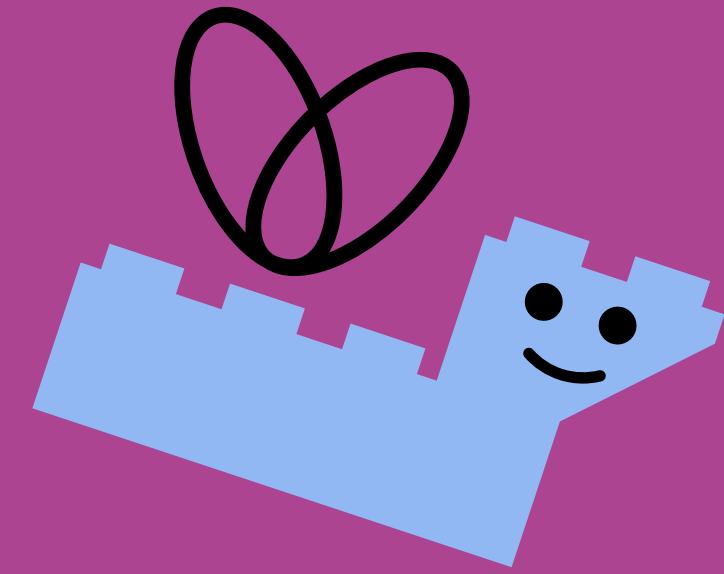



**GROWN-UP:**

grab your LEGO bricks and let's go!





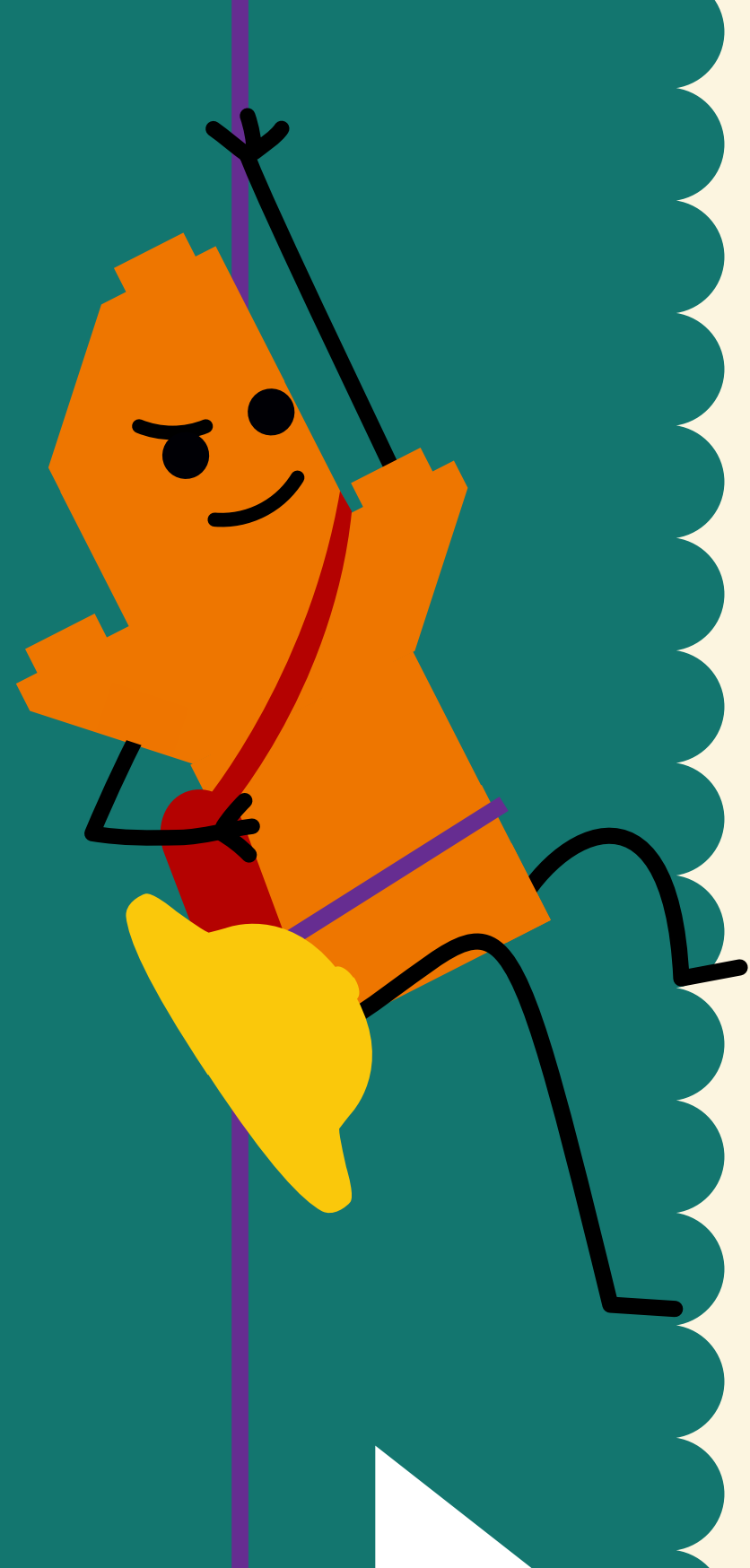

Big ears for listening to so many opinions

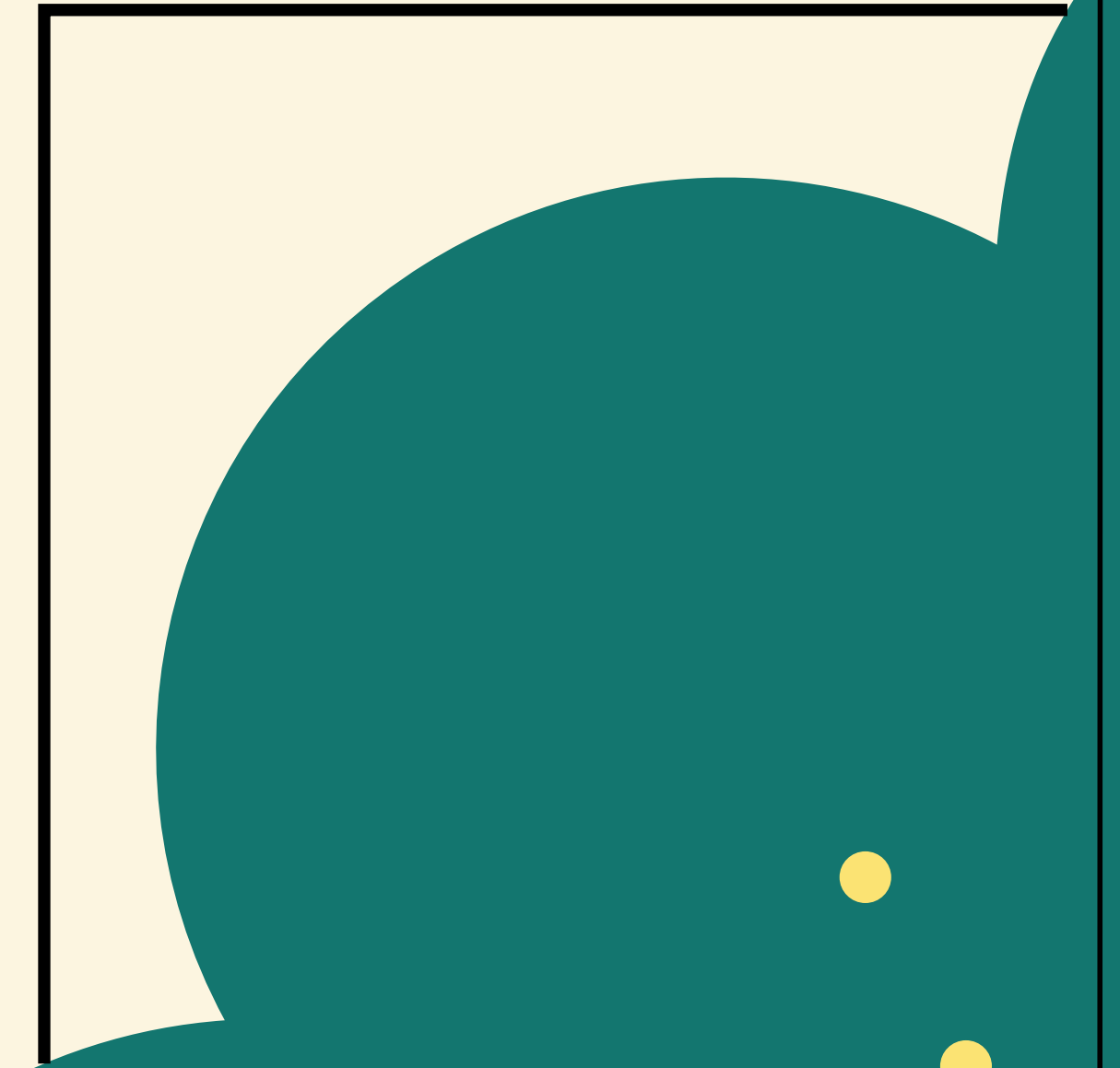


Wide open arms ready to embrace anyone they meet

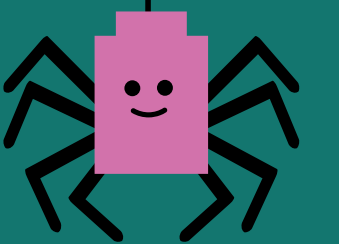
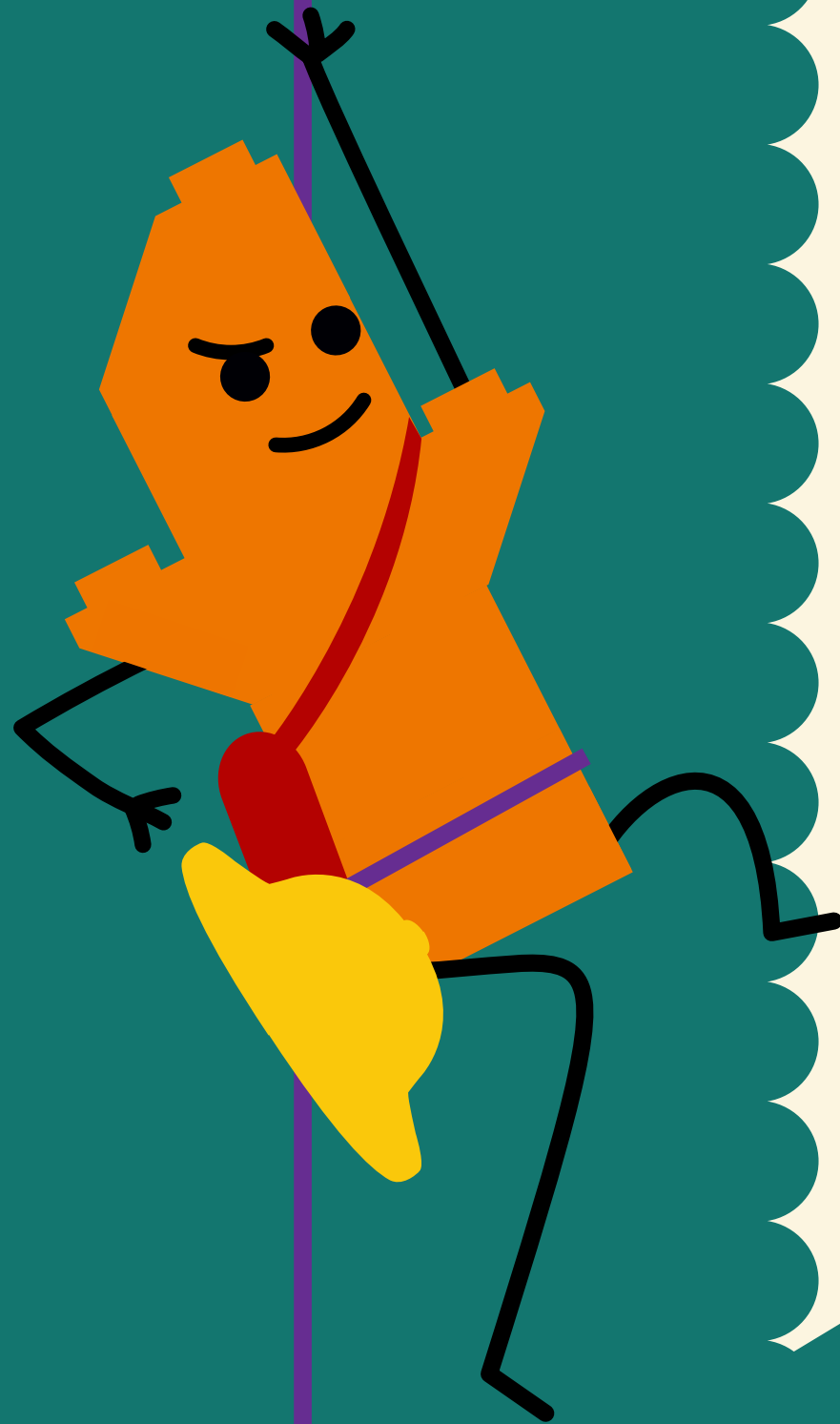


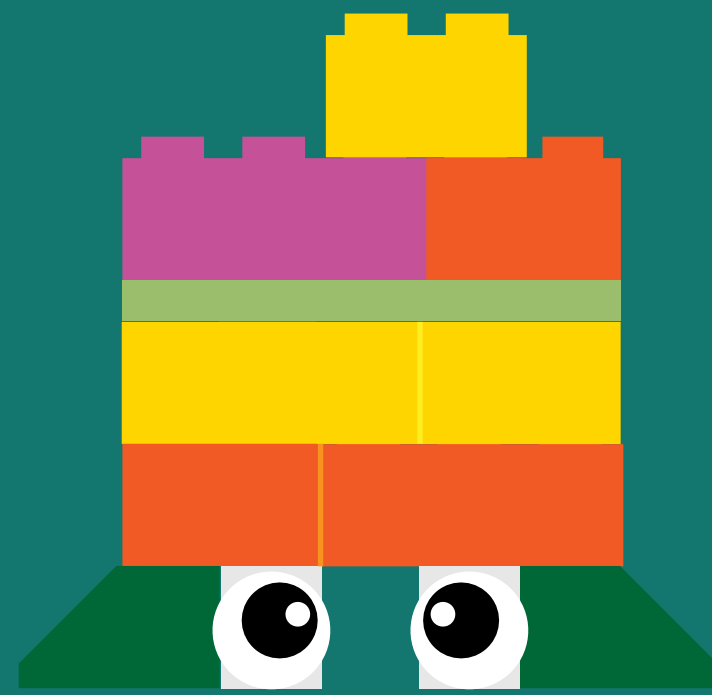

## ***Illustration of typical Believe-It-All***

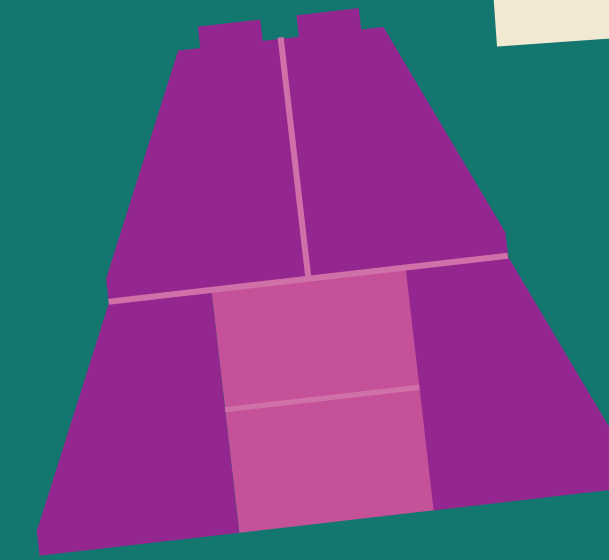

*Below are some questions to ask your little explorer as they build.*

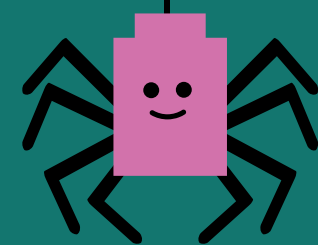
Why do you think it's important not to believe everything you see or hear online?

Why do you think people change images on social media? Have you ever used a filter to change a photo?



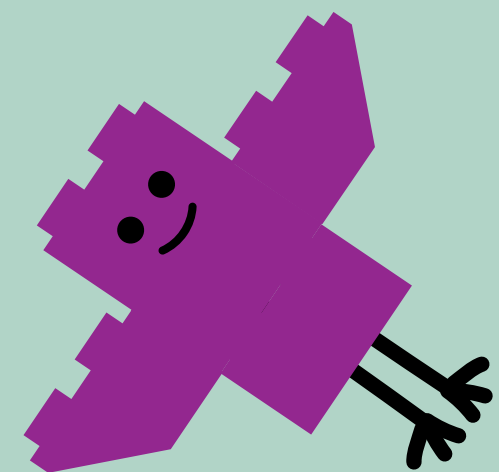
Wow, that is spot on! You really are an expert builder. You must've done this before.

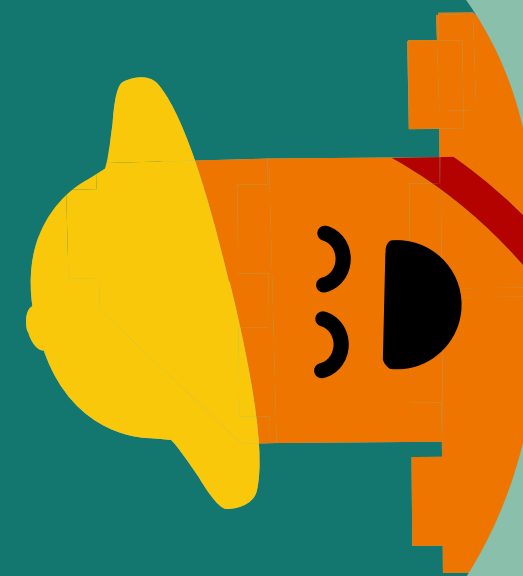

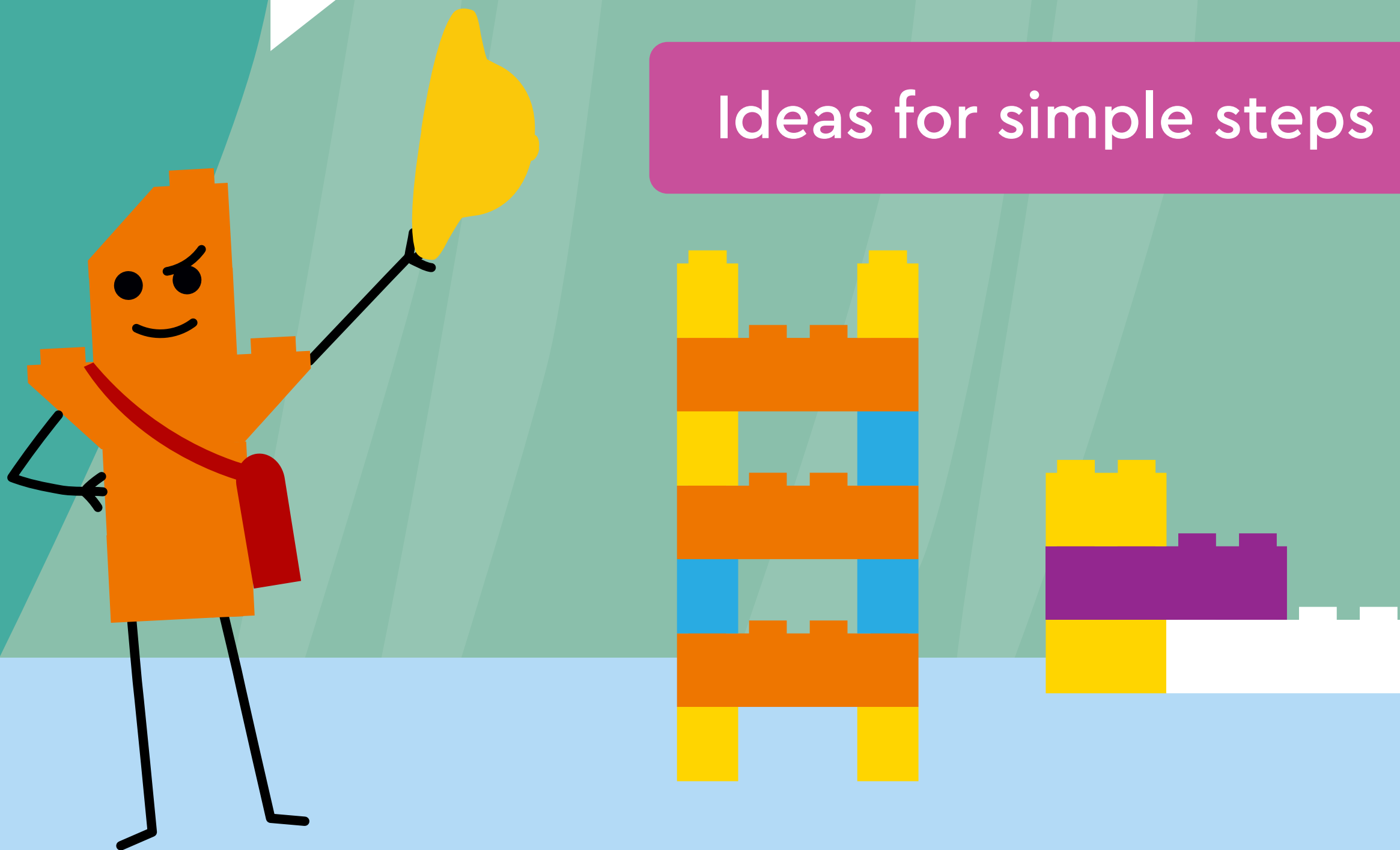
Oh dear, it's a Believe-It-All.

How can you tell that someone online isn't who they say they are?

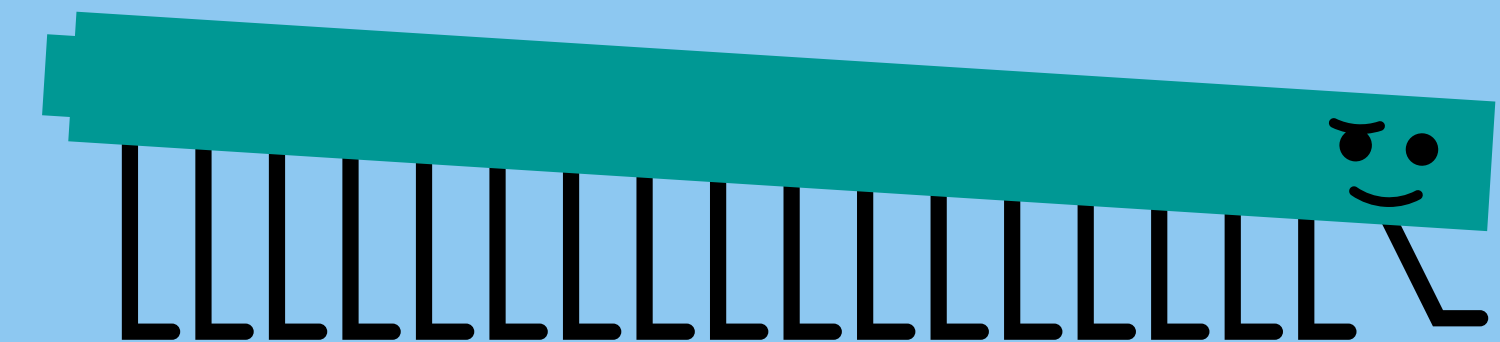
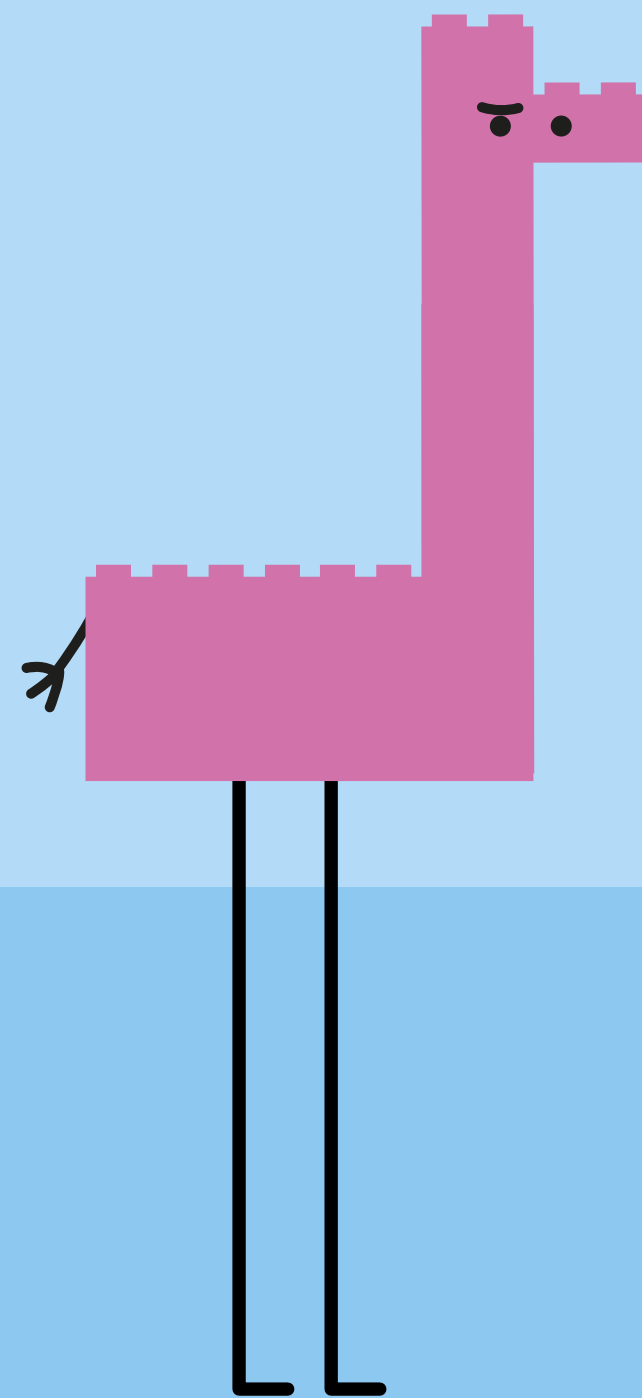
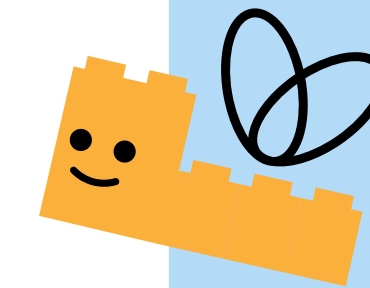

We'll remember to fact-check information using reliable sources.



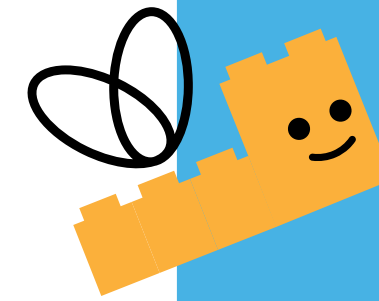
We'll also remember to be mindful of people we don't know and to never share personal information with a stranger.
