BEFORE YOU START

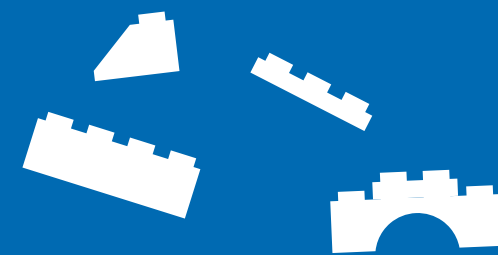
Flick through the story yourself so you understand how it works.

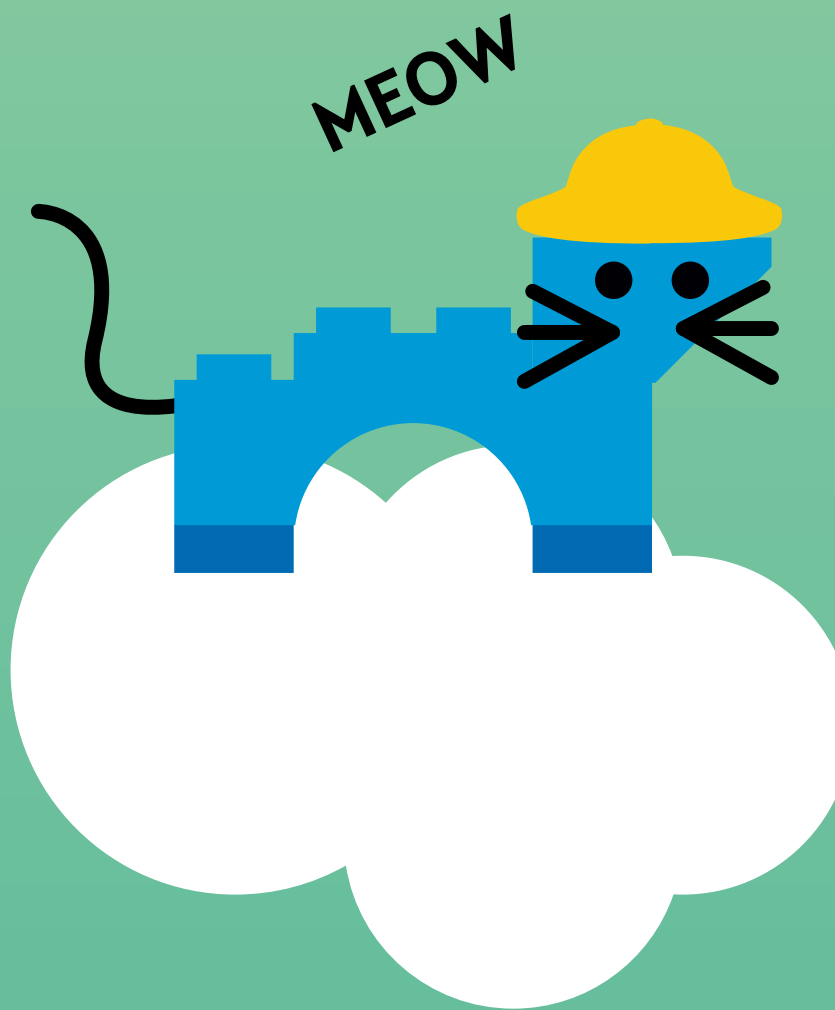




My book will help every online explorer

tore up my book and ATE all the pictures.

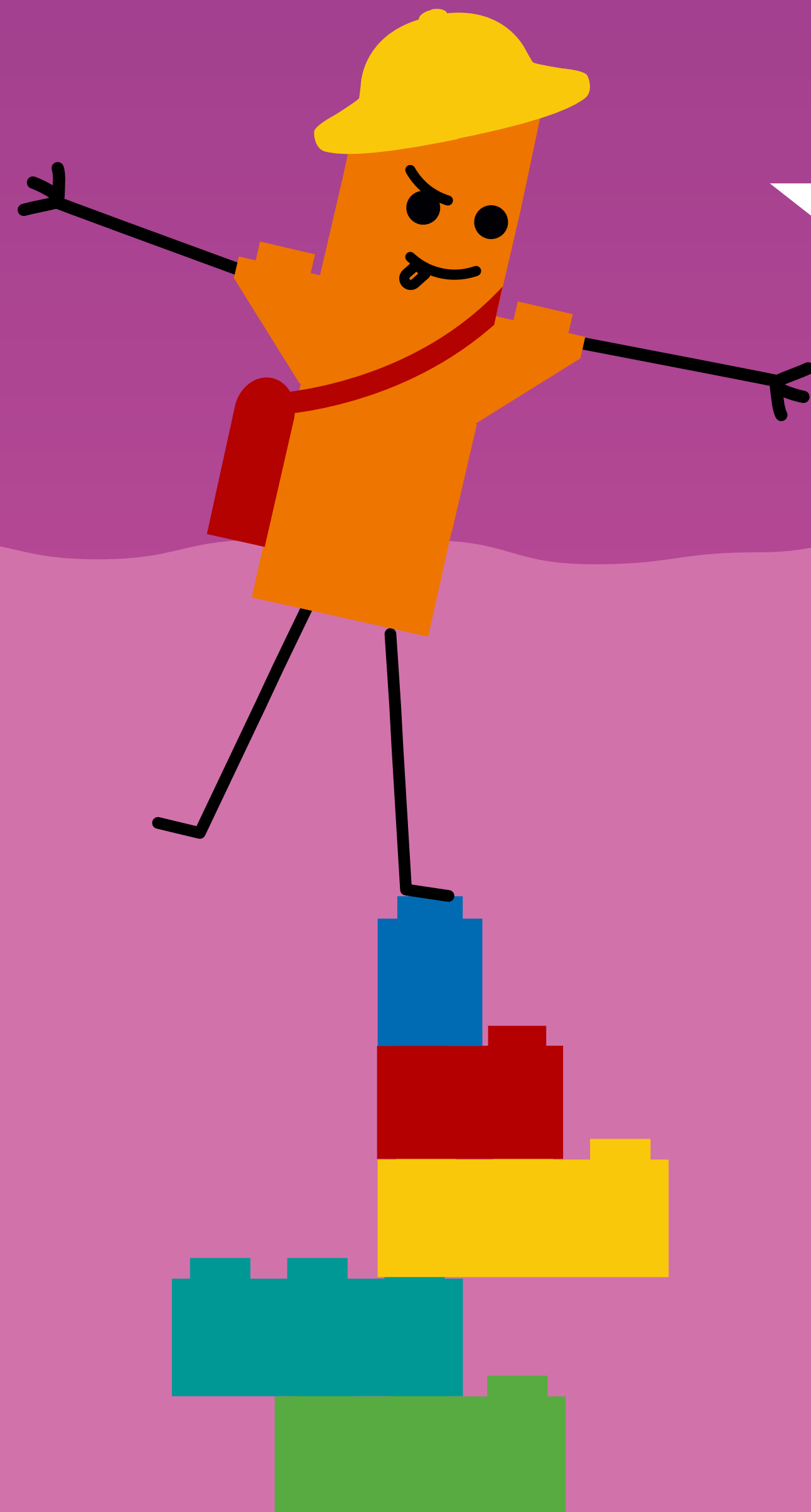




Only a few scraps of my book remain and NO pictures.

And nobody under 100 years old will want to read a book without any pictures.

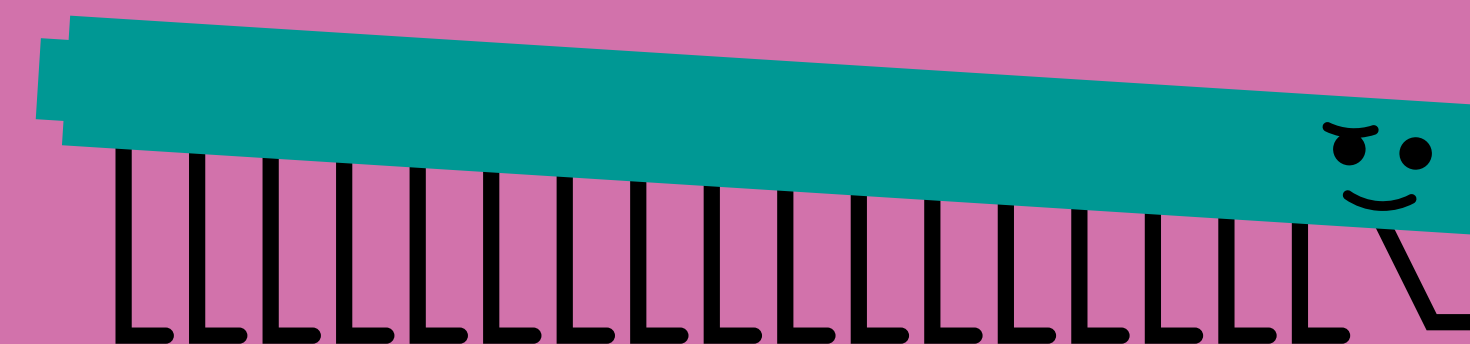
Also, online explorers like you won't know what to look out for.

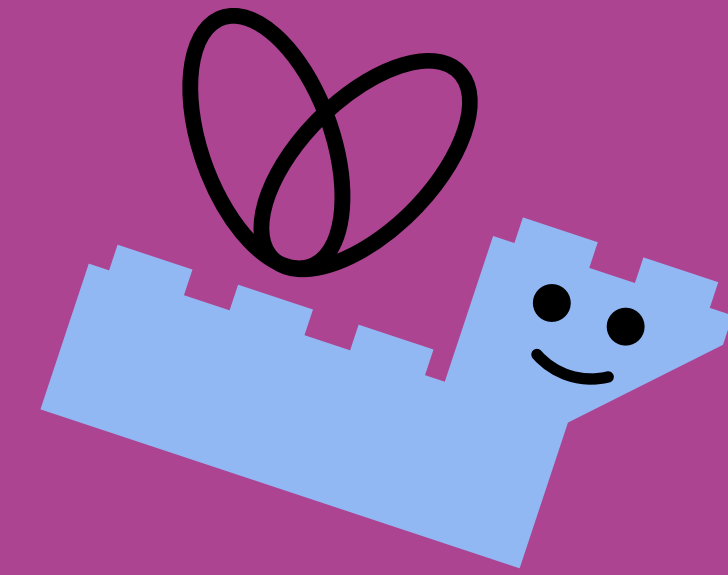


SPLENDID!

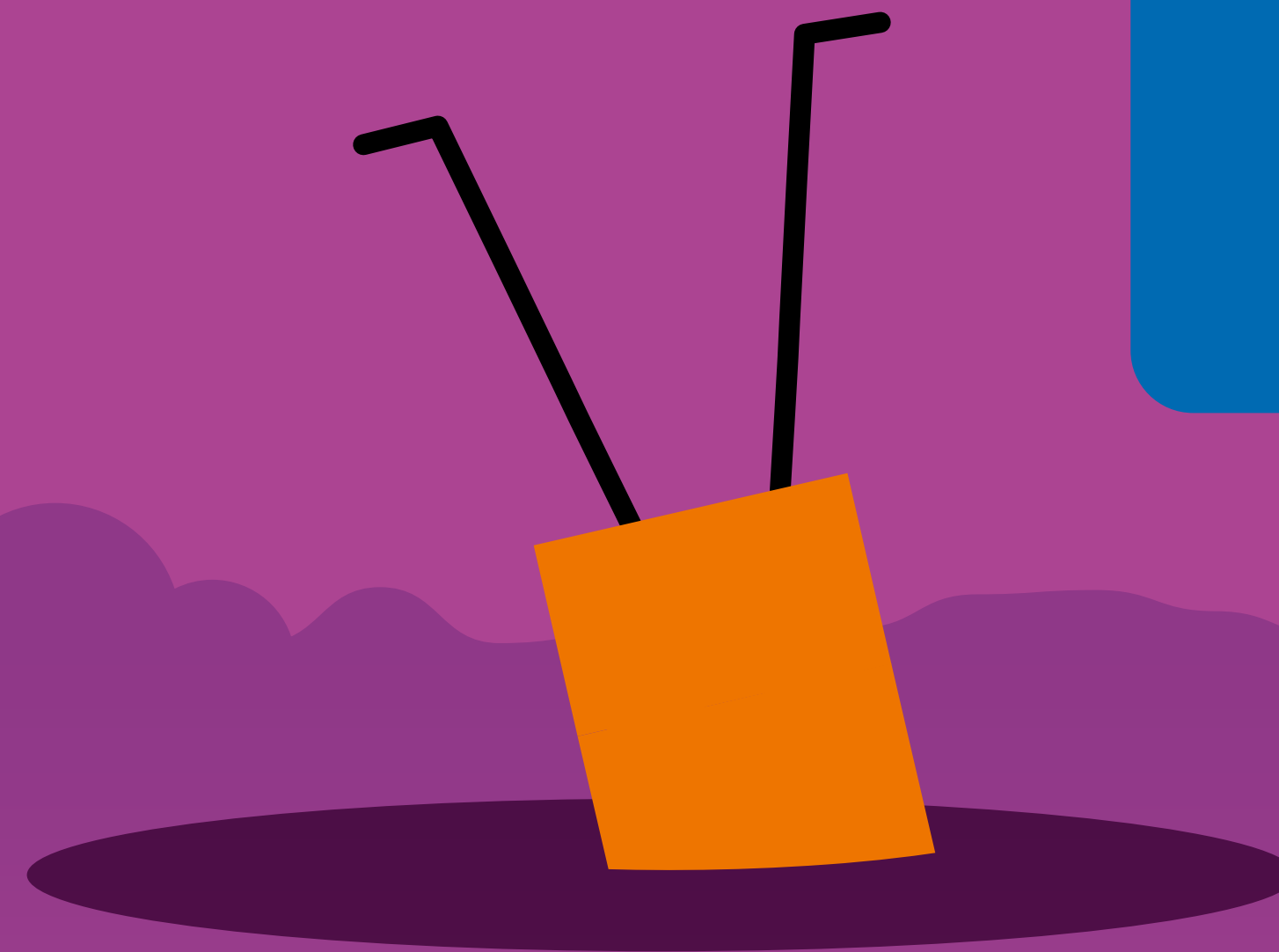
I'll read you a description from my book and you can build along.

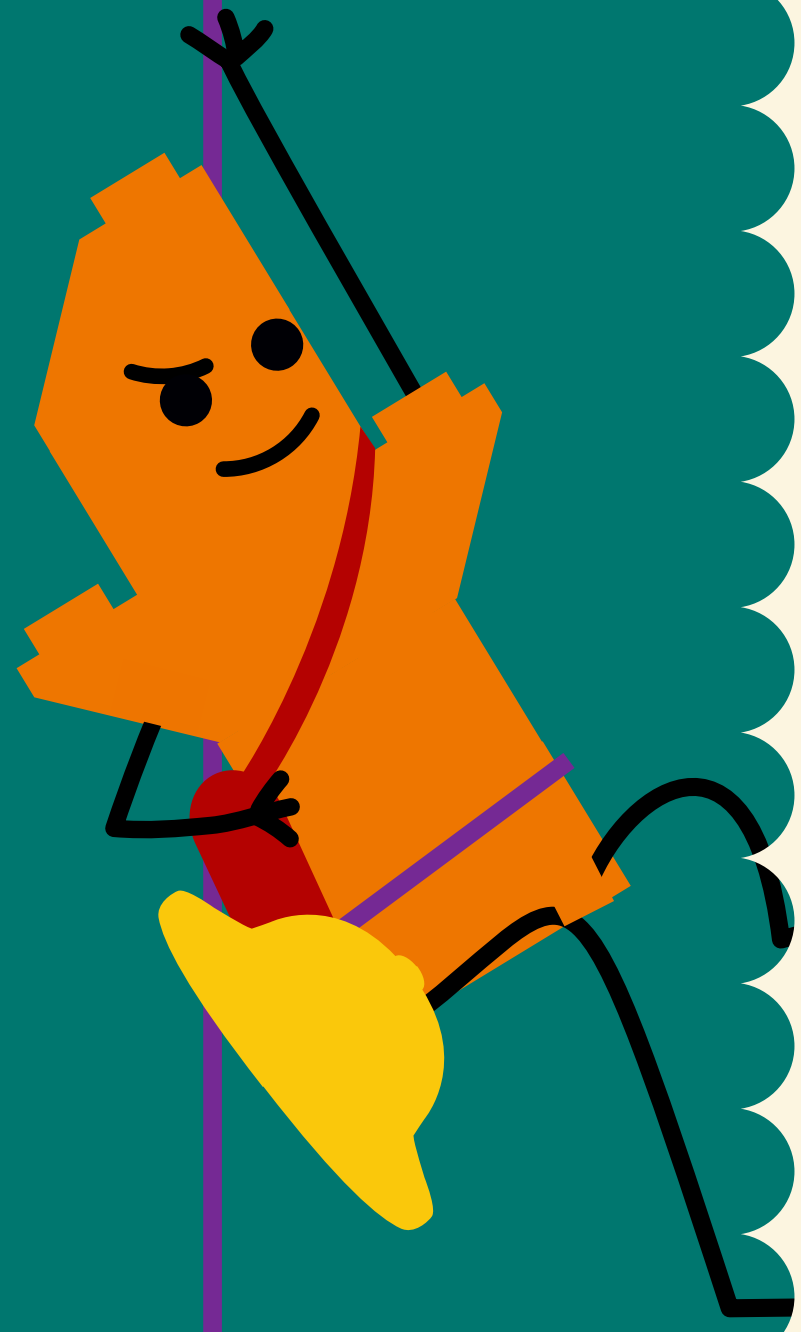

Big ears for listening to so many opinions

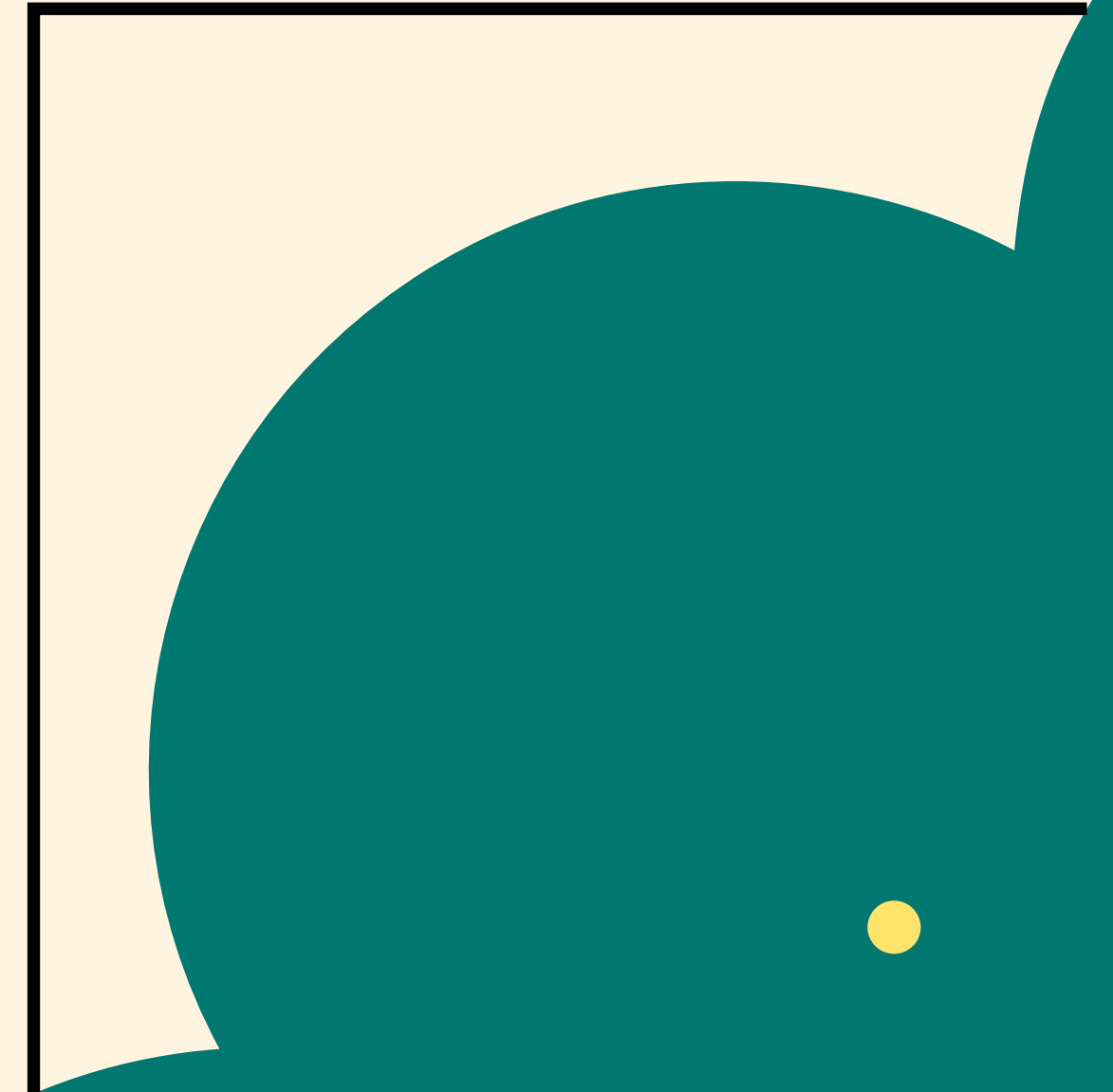


Wide open arms ready to embrace anyone they meet

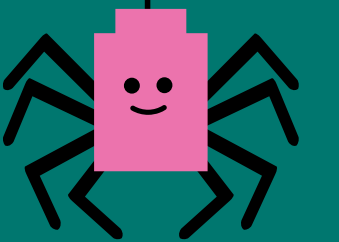


Big feet, perfect for following the crowd!

Why do you think people change images on social media? Have you ever used a filter to change a photo?

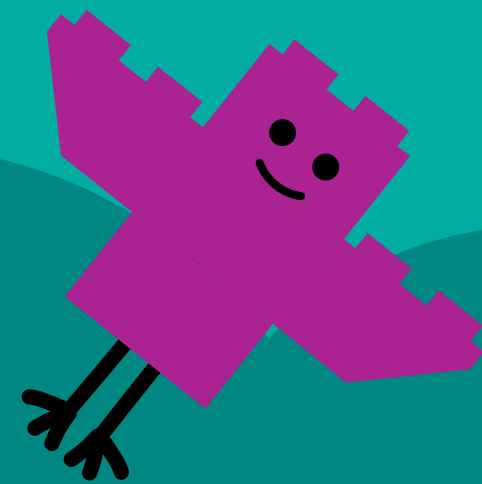


Wow, that is spot on! You really are an expert builder. You must've done this before.

Wait, can you hear that noise?

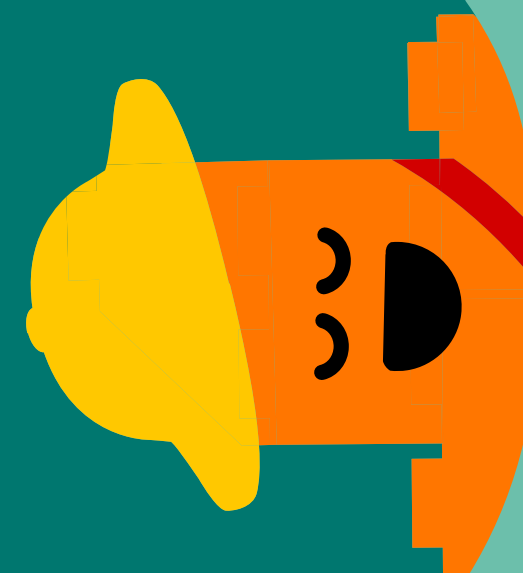

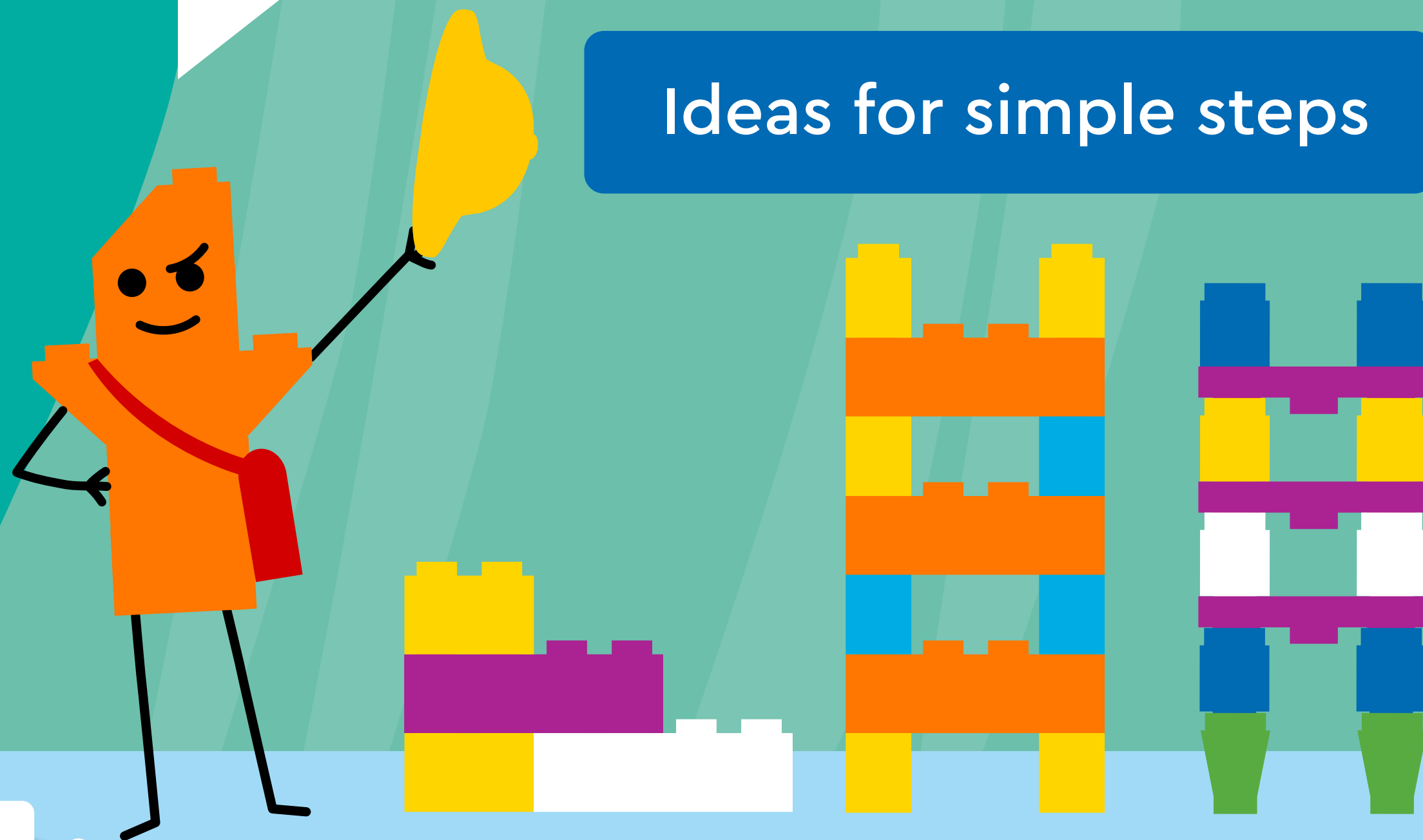


Oh dear, it's a Believe-It-All.

Has someone you don't know ever approached you online? Why do you think it's important not to reply?

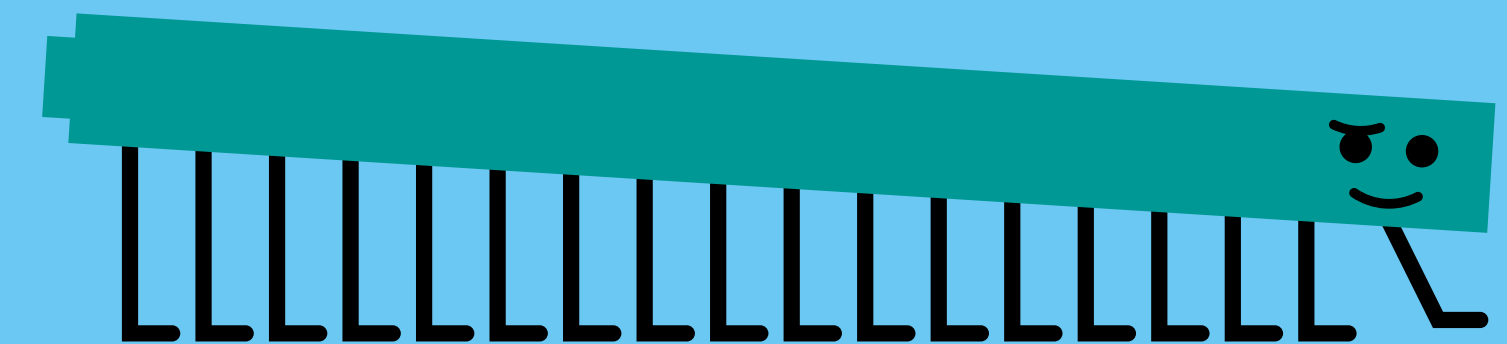
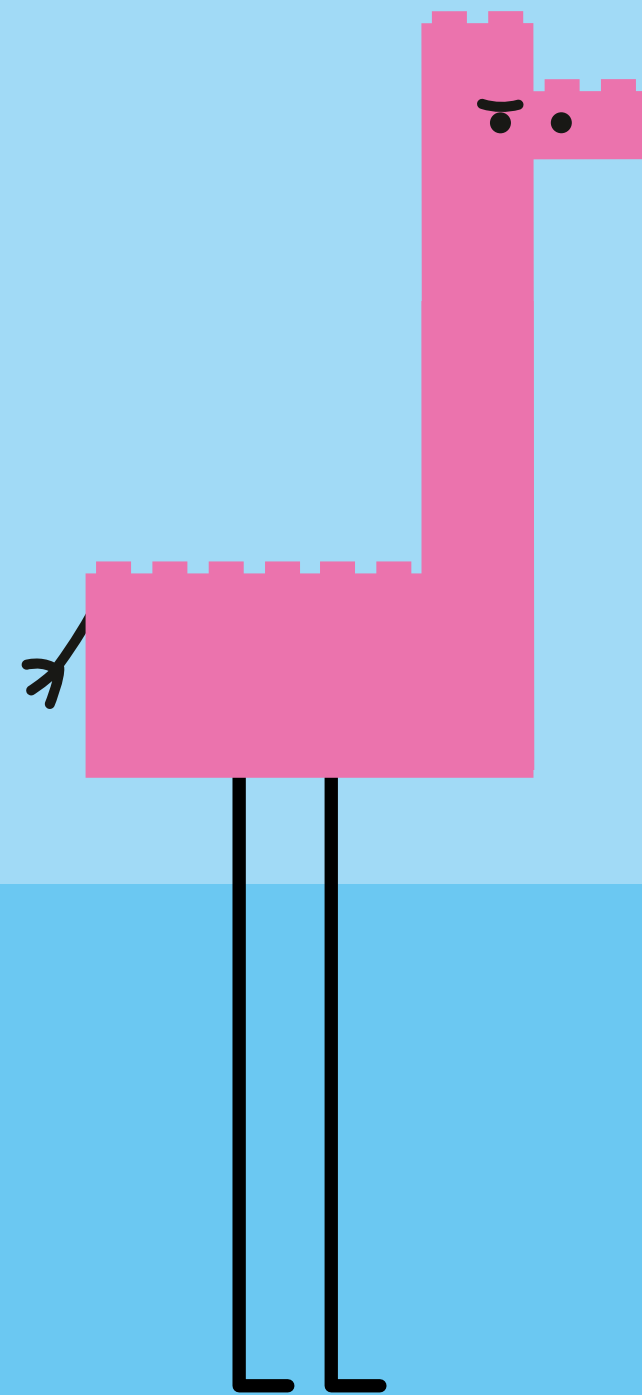
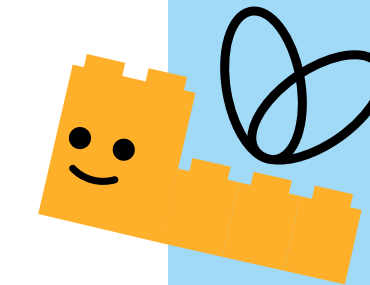

Why is it important to avoid sharing personal information with people you don't know?

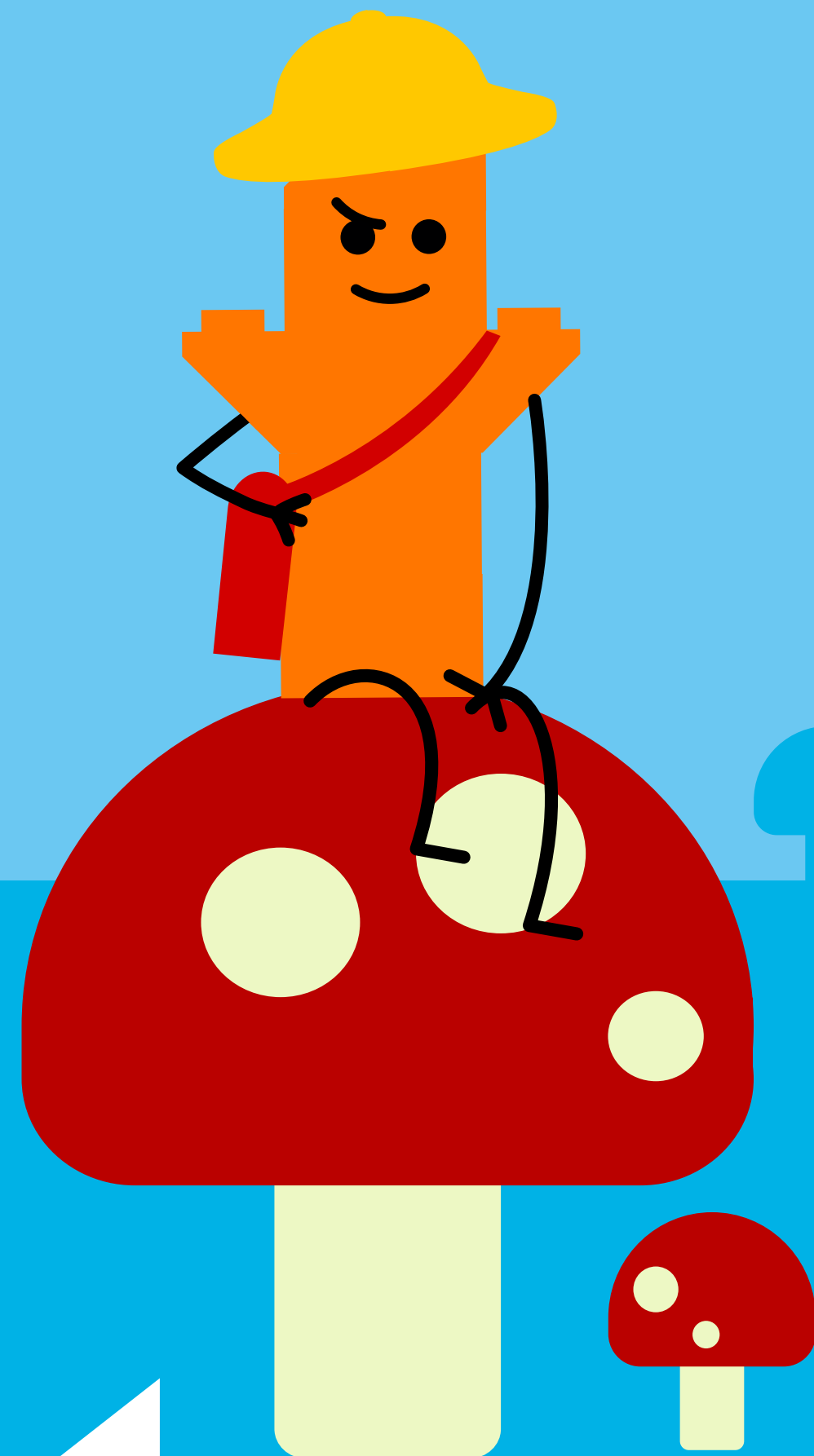
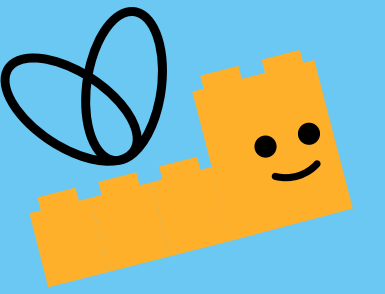

Read along together with your grown-up:

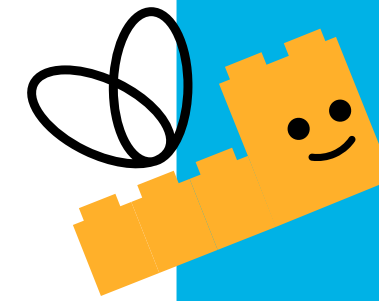


Marvellous work!
